



King - Assured that the British would "try all we can to keep out of this and shall remain neutral"




Kaiser - Could declare a state of war if he deemed the security of his empire to be at risk


Secretary of State - Argued that the assassination offered the Austrians the opportunity to demonstrate they were still capable of action

Foreign Minister -Hearing terms of the ultimatum to Serbia, concluded that




Prime Minister - After accessing the situation in Europe on 24th July he feared a "real Armaggedon" might be within sight

This map shows the key European leaders and figures involved in the outbreak of World War I






Common **Finance** Minister


